Father Frost is the Russian Santa Claus. And, there are 20 of them. Each figurine is unique and very finely painted. The detail is so incredible and so beautiful. Please look at the backs of each of the large hand carved and hand painted Father Frosts.

Catherine started by buying one because she thought it was so pretty and so detailed. Probably her favorite one is the blue one on the second shelf with the horses and sleigh painted on the front, and, farthest to the right. She thinks this one is her first purchase. Be sure to look at the wooded scene on the back. Gorgeous! She has been collecting Father Frost figurines for the past ten years as well as all the other beautiful detailed figurines that fill in between each Father Frost.

If you look at each one, you'll see how totally unique and different each is. Each Father Frost is a work of art and most came from the Sugar River Art Gallery in New Glarus or the Cranberry Festival in Warrens Wisconsin. Catherine has purchased each one herself-early Christmas gifts to herself!

The Russian Father Frost, in Legend, all have big full white beards and flowing cloaks as well as a staff. During the vuletide season, Father Frost

visits boys and girls by traveling from his home in the woods in a decorated sleigh drawn by three horses.

The figures with the Snow Maiden (his granddaughter) painted on them are usually more expensive as they are much rarer.

You'll want to check out the bottom shelf for beautiful Russian boxes and a gorgeous set of Russian nesting dolls. Thank you so much, Catherine, for sharing this fabulous collection with us this December. You must miss them at your home.
