Try It At Home: Design Your Own Wrapping Paper

What you'll need to make your own Christmas wrapping paper:

- Butcher paper or construction paper
- Acrylic paints (they dry fast, that's why we love them)
- Paintbrushes
- Glitter

Before starting this activity, talk with the kids about how real designs are made by an artist creating a small version of the design that is copied and mass produced later on.

Also talk about symmetry and making sure the design would look good in a repeating pattern. It's best to illustrate this by folding a paper into quarters and adding a dot of paint to the lines. Then, when the paper is folded back up, the design is the same on both sides.

Go crazy with your design!

When you are finished, you can always upload your design and send it to a copier if you want it more like real wrapping paper. Otherwise, you can use the smaller pieces of paper for wrapping ...

When kids are designing their wrapping paper, they are using not only art skills, but engineering skills! Engineering uses science and math to solve real-world problems. Engineering is used for everything from building roads to completing data analysis tools at an insurance company. There is almost no career today that does not use engineering in some capacity!
